Learning Updates

Junior Class

This term, the F-2 students have been learning all about water in Science. Last week, we investigated what happens to rain when it falls on different surfaces. We identified a range of different surfaces around the school and predicted what would happen when we poured water onto it. We then observed the water and found that it either soaked in or ran off the different surfaces.




How to Grow a Mango Tree

Goal: Get the mango tree to sprout. by Jett Meek

- Materials: a mango, scissors, water, paper towel, a dark space and a knife. Grab your mange and cut the seed out with a knife.
- 2. Use your scissors to cut the seed out of the pouch. 3. Wet some paper towel then squeeze until damp.
- 4. Grab the seed (not the pouch) and wrap it in paper towel and firmly pat it
- 5. Put the seed in a very dark space where it won't get any sunlight. Make 6. Leave it there for a week then grab it and sit it in the water for two 7. Either leave it in water or if it has roots you can plant it in soil to grow.

I have enjoyed getting to know the families and children of Cape Clear Primary School. It has been a great few months being able to have fun with everyone, chat about emotions and tricky situations, and also being able to teach the two classes in Respectful Relationships.

In Respectful Relationships the Prep to Grade 3's have recently started the topic of fair play and what this looks like. We discussed types of leaders and what traits they have. I have been so impressed by this class with their thoughts and ideas around respect.

For Respectful Relationships in the Grade 4 to 6's room we have been discussing the strengths we each have,

and strengths others around us have. Our topic we are now covering is Positive Self-Talk. We are hoping to see the children be able to apply this topic which will ultimately improve mental health and having a positive mindset.

Easy tip: An easy thing we can implement at home is a 'Gratitude Journal'. A gratitude journal improves mental health and helps to change our mindset to be positive. In this journal you write down 5 things you are grateful for each day. This helps to focus on the things which are good in life, rather than the disappointments, and overall can reduce stress!
